SERVICE FLAGS were first introduced in the United States in 1917 after the U.S. entered World War I. They were proudly displayed by those who had immediate family members in the Armed Services. Each star represented a soldier: blue for those on active duty in the military; gold signifying the loss of a loved one in the service during the war.

Mothers and widows of fallen soldiers banded together in the 1920s and successfully lobbied Congress in 1929 to approve federally-funded pilgrimages to Europe to visit their loved ones' graves. Between 1930 and 1933, over 6,500 Gold Star mothers and widows traveled to Europe through this program. One Gold Star mother from Georgetown, Jennie Tidd, made the pilgrimage, and we are pleased to present her story.

A GOLD STAR MOTHER'S PILGRIMAGE

At the age of 66, twelve years after her eldest son's death during the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, Joseph Tidd's mother, Jennie Hoyt Tidd, boarded a steamship on June 24, 1930 and set off to visit her son's grave in France. Three of her sons had enlisted and seen combat, but Joseph was the only one who did not come home. To honor the occasion and to create a memoir for her family, Jennie kept a journal during her trip across the



ocean. She wrote almost every day and filled a notebook with precise details of the trains, boats and coaches that she and her travel companions used during their journey. She wrote of the food, local people, traditions and culture that she found in France. During her pilgrimage, Jennie met local women from Massachusetts, some of whom she already knew. Her words convey the monotony of ocean travel, the excitement of Paris and the joy and relief she felt as she finally reached her son's grave at the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery. To the Tidd family, Joseph was known as "Big Brother." Here are some excerpts from Jennie's journal:



TUESDAY, JUNE 24: Left Georgetown at 7:35 a.m. for North Station, Boston, where I met about forty other Gold Star Mothers, among them Mrs. Mary Horsch of Haverhill, the only one I had ever seen before. Seats were roped off for us, and then we went by bus to the South Station, where we were greeted by a band, and after hearing some speeches left on the train for New York. We had a fine dinner on the train as we passed Providence, R.I. We reached New York about 3:45 and were taken to the Hotel Commodore.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 25: At 9:00 a.m. we took busses for Hoboken, N.J. to board the S.S. Republic. A large crowd bade us farewell and we were soon on our way. There is nothing to do but eat, sleep and walk the deck, so there is not very much to tell as yet. Saturday (June 28) we all went to the Social Hall and were presented with bronze medals, and a certificate from the S.S. line.

SUNDAY, JULY 6: 8:00 a.m. for PARIS – six hours on the train, and by bus to Commodore Hotel in Paris, and here I am now, rooming (by her request) with a Mrs. Foster of Foxboro, Mass. She knows the Jackson boys and President Wood of Gordon College, and I'll tell you more when I see you soon.

TUESDAY, JULY 8: Today we go to the cemetery, twenty miles from here. I'm very thankful for the friends who sent flowers to Big Brother's grave, and am very glad I'm here to place them there. This has been a wonderful journey and if we find PEACE at the end, it will be all the more wonderful.



WEDNESDAY, JULY 9: Left at 9:00 a.m. and went to the cemetery. Before us on a slope were the white crosses. We were called by letter, each plot having a letter A & B, C & D, E & F, so I went to plot F, row 6, grave 17. Never did I walk so slow for fear - - that I should not find his name there, but it was there, and now I feel that my son sleeps there in one of the beauty spots of a beautiful country. I placed a wreath of lovely flowers and greens there on his grave, and shall take more on Friday a.m.

THURSDAY, JULY 10: Went to Meuse Argonne Cemetery again today. After lunch we went on to what they called the "Trench of Bayonets," where French soldiers were buried standing in the trenches with the tops of their rifles above ground. We went on through a shell marked country, where every now and then the remains of dugouts and foxholes are shown.

FRIDAY, JULY 11: It is raining but we go the cemetery just the same, as our flowers will be there. Brother's resting place is covered now. It stopped raining just long enough for me to get up there. On our way this morning a woman who was passing asked our nurse what the bus full of flowers was for. She told her, and the dear soul lifted her hands and blessed us for coming here on this errand, giving her love and sympathy to the mothers who came so far to see their sons' graves; she added, "I lost a son too," and went on wiping her tears.

SATURDAY, JULY 12 A.M. Today we will go to the cemetery to say our last farewell to the resting place we love so well. I'm thankful for the privilege of coming, and pray that I may live so that I may be fit to meet my dear son when I too "go West."

SUNDAY, JULY 24: Reached North Station at 4:10 then went by train to Haverhill. My daughters and their husbands met me there and now I am HOME. It was a wonderful trip and I thank everyone for their kindness to me.

BROCKLEBANK MUSEUM – LOOKING GOOD!


