HENRY FORD AND THE SPOFFORD SAWMILL

When the western part of Rowley became a separate parish in 1731, many more families began moving to the area. This was good news for house builders like Abner Spofford. With a need for lumber to build the homes. Abner decided to build a sawmill on his land on Andover Street. The water-powered "up-anddown" style mill was constructed circa 1740 on Lufkin's brook and did brisk business in the fast growing community.



Abner Spofford was well known and actively involved in the community. He was captain of the local militia in 1743, a church deacon, and the father of nine children, several of whom also became house builders and millwrights. Abner kept working until 1777, when he was tragically killed in a fall in his sawmill at age 73.



The mill remained in the Spofford family until 1861, when it was purchased by Charles R. Weston and his cousin, George S. Weston. The Weston family continued to own and operate the historic mill until 1925.

Auto manufacturer Henry Ford was a collector of Americana. He envisioned a "Village Green" style living-history museum and began purchasing historic buildings to be dismantled and reconstructed in his new village. Mr. Ford learned of the old mill in Georgetown, one of the last of its kind still in operation. The owner,

Ida Morse (daughter of Charles R. Weston) was contacted, and eventually a sale was negotiated. The old mill and its machinery were dismantled and placed on railroad cars for shipment to Michigan.

A new mill was designed and constructed using the original machinery and an original support beam. Although neither a reconstruction nor a replica, it is still known as the Spofford Sawmill. It can be seen today at Henry Ford's Greenfield Village Museum in Dearborn, Michigan.
